What:

Come join us for an open discussion with a guest from the UW biomedical research faculty at large (clinical, basic, translational) who will share who they are, what they do, and how their unique identity has shaped and challenged the ways in which they navigate a successful scientific career. Each meeting will feature a different faculty member and will provide a safe space for honest conversations about career pathways, mentorship, advancement, resources, and our intersectional identities.

This monthly meet-up is intended to broaden the access of biomedical trainees to senior faculty of diverse identities and research/clinical career paths in the UW community and beyond.
