Who:



Guest Human:

Justin Bullock, MD, is a clinician researcher in Nephrology at the University of Washington School of Medicine and the co-director of the Docs with Disabilities Initiative. Justin is passionate about creating safe environments in medicine where everyone in the hospital is able to bring their authentic selves to work in the spirit of healing. His primary research centers on how educators can foster identity safety in the learning environment, where all members of the healthcare team can be their authentic selves in the workplace. Drawing on his dual identities as a patient and provider with bipolar disorder, Justin believes deeply that medicine is a lifelong journey of healing as much for providers as it is for patients.
